Who Are We?

Sunnyside Community Services (SCS) is a nonprofit that provides diverse programs to support struggling families and individuals of all ethnicities and income levels in Queens since 1974. Our services range from pre-K to college and career readiness, home care, Beacon and Cornerstone community centers, an older adult center, and supportive services for at-risk older adults and their caregivers.



Our Goal

- To promote and implement intergenerational connections and understanding through diverse activities and initiatives, with support from the UNH Strengthening Older Adults program.
- To create a nurturing environment that encourages the exchange of ideas, experiences, and knowledge.



Our Values

Community members of all ages are:

- Fully integrated in the broader community and are connected.
- Are seen as important and valued resources for the greater good, addressing community issues in ways that strengthen civic and community life.
- Are recognized and respected for their skills, knowledge, experience and interests.
- Have numerous opportunities to work together to contribute to their communities in ways that are meaningful and impactful.



What Makes Our Work Unique?

•Intergenerational programming in Queens:

- 1. Positives: Cross-cultural connections, empathy, and community.
- 2. Challenges: Cultural differences can cause conflict, language barriers can hinder communication, and accessibility can be an issue.
- •Culturally responsive approach needed:
 - 1. Sensitivity to participants' diverse backgrounds and needs.
 - 2. Translation services offered.
 - 3. Activities cater to different cultural traditions.



Queens, NY is one of the most diverse counties in the United States with a population of over 2.3 million people from more than 100 different countries. The most significant ethnic groups are Hispanic/Latino, Asian, African American, and White. The borough's diversity is reflected in its varied cuisine, shops, and cultural events.

The Space itself


- Older adult center offers:
 - Health and wellness programs
 - Social activities
 - Educational opportunities
 - Adult day services
- Previously successful Middle School program
- Currently offers Universal Pre-Kindergarten program
- Youth services programs positively impact over 2,500 youth annually
- ESOL program helps individuals improve English language skills
- Home care services, support for family caregivers, and social adult day program for people with cognitive and physical impairments available.






Sharing Spaces

- From the outset, we leveraged our older adult and middle school programs situated at the center to foster intergenerational interactions. We are expanding this to our Pre-K programs and ESOL programs.
- We established clear expectations and provided guidance for both parties.
- We introduced a self-guided program for older adults, aimed at enhancing their experience.
- We expanded our co-leading opportunities through our "I Teach You, You Teach Me" initiative.
- We created safe, neutral spaces to encourage positive interactions.
- We ensured that each shared space was equally valued and respected.













The Steps We Took

- 1. Establishing Key Personnel for Enhanced Work and Collaboration.
- 2. Creating a Secure and Safe Environment for Productive Engagement Preparing for Successful Engagement.
- 3. We scheduled meetings with staff, older adults, and youth to discuss activities in advance, so we can ensure that everyone is on the same page and ready to contribute.

Challenges We Faced

- 1. Enhancing Intergenerational Scheduling: Promoting Activities for Older Adults and Youth Together
- 2. Empowering Self-guided Older Adults to Participate More Fully in Programs
- 3. Strengthening Staffing Resources to Support Program Participants
- 4. Adapting to Program Restrictions and Regulations Pre- and Post-Pandemic
- 5. Ensuring Adequate and Safe Space for Program Activities
- 6. Creating Concrete Strategies for Sustainable Program Continuity





Solutions To Building Program Opportunities

- Collaborate with other community-based organizations (CBOs) engaged in intergenerational work for greater impact.
- Identify and utilize opportunities for intergenerational activities during school breaks and holidays.
- Create a persuasive elevator pitch to communicate the value of intergenerational work to staff and participants and gain support.
- Develop a clear and easy-to-understand system for implementing intergenerational work, including the Co-led Model, Co-educational Model, and Service Model.













How We Build Connections

- Create shared activities
- 2. Encourage mentoring and learning
- 3. Foster inclusivity and respect
- 4. Provide opportunities for community involvement
- 5. Celebrate diversity





Our Intergenerational Work Today

- 12 high school students and 50 older adults participated in intergenerational activities during the summer.
- Created a co-educational Chess program.
- Partnered with the American Folk Art Museum for interactive programs on-site and at the museum.
- Older adults and youth audited the 3G Sesame Initiative.
- Youth helped older adults access food programs through service model activities.
- Implemented engaging activities during Mid Winter break and added new key staff members to support the work.



Future plans

- Implement a self care cosmetology intergenerational program.
- Outreach to High School cheerleaders to support intergenerational programs.
- Collaborate our popular chess activity with other organizations doing intergenerational work.
- Work with more key staff to develop program opertunities.
- We want to establish a intergenerational choir.














Location: Urban Hub within Eds & Meds Corridor




