





STAGE 3

Reflecting and visualising

Encourage all participants to draw the story of their life in the shape of a river (or using a metaphor that works well for them)



Approx 30 minutes

USEFUL PROMPT QUESTIONS TO USE AS YOU DRAW THE RIVER:

- When and how has your life changed direction?
- When has life flowed smoothly, or felt like a bumpy ride?
- When have you encountered joy or challenges?

TIP

If facilitating workshop with youth...

Consider unpacking some auestions further. For example, who is important in their life? Friends? Family members?

POSSIBLE KEY MOMENTS YOU MIGHT INCLUDE IN THE LIFE RIVER:

- Becoming aware of your sexual orientation or gender identity
- 'Coming out' to different key people in your life
- Deciding you would start your transition journey
- Same-sex relationships
- Chosen families
- Moving to new places and environments.

TIP

Non-visual alternatives to this activity:

- Write a letter to your younger/older self
- Write a poem that expresses different periods in your life as an LGBTQ+ person
